- 2) Old Wives' Tales express cultural beliefs related to our actions. They provide consequences for a specific behavior of ours. Can you identify the behavior and its consequence in each of these sentences? Analyze the sentences, underline the the behavior and circle its possible consequence. Compare your answers with your partner's.

Possible answers: the clauses in bold represent the *behavior* and the clauses in italics represent the *possible consequence*.

- a) **If you sit too close to the TV,** *you will have eye diseases.*
- b) **If you eat 12 grapes at midnight on New Year's Eve,** *you will have 12 months of good luck.*
- c) **If you go outside wearing not enough clothes,** *you will get a cold.*
- d) **If you swallow a piece of gum,** *it will be in your stomach for seven years.*
- e) **If you drink coffee when you are drunk,** *it will help you sober up.*
