Who would you have been if you were just an ordinary girl from the Swat Valley.

I'm still an ordinary girl, but if I had an ordinary father in an ordinary mother then I would have two children now.

This is my youngest brother, he's a really good boy. This is the laziest one.

My father said if I had forgiven them.

You've ever felt angry? No.

I want people to learn from the experience I had.

Nice to see you! Hello, nice to see you!

A woman is more powerful than man.

The new school is really hard. Physics... 61%...

Do you think you get ever asked a boy out on a date? Roger Federer... do you like him? I like his haircut.

When I think of home I missed the dirt streets, I missed river, I miss my friends, I just want to see that house just once.

You named her after a girl who spoke out and was killed, almost as if you said she'll be different . You're right.

I am those 66 million girls, who are deprived of Education, and not a lonely voice, I am many. Now our voices are our more powerful weapons. One child, one teacher, one book and one pen, this can change the world.

My father only gave me the name Malala, he didn't make me Malala. I chose this life and now I must continue it.
